- Stakeholder focused
- Bridging financial and other types of performance
- Continuous improvement

International reporting trends

- Increase in reports from
 - Emerging markets: Brazil & China
 - SMEs
- Online reporting
- External verification
- Integrated reporting
- Supply chain focus





Future reporting context

- Demand for sustainability performance information is increasing
 - Including from regulators
- Metrics not coherent or harmonized
- Lack of precision
 - Can lead to high reporting and assurance costs
- Most reports lack material focus
- Information in pdf or other unfriendly formats
- Integrated reporting is a trend





G4 Objectives

- To be user-friendly for beginners and experienced reporters
- To improve the technical quality, clearer definitions
- To align with other reporting frameworks
- To offer guidance which leads to material reports ("materiality")
- To offer guidance on how to link the sustainability reporting and Integrated Report aligned with IIRC
- To provide support to improve data search (XBRL)

G4's main work streams

- 1. Technical standardization
- 2. Profound revision of parts of G3(G3.1) or new content proposals
- 3. Harmonization (and references updating)
- 4. G4 online
- 5. XBRL GRI Taxonomy for G4
- 6. Sector guidance in G4

First G4 Public Comment Period (26 August - 24 November 2011)

Feedback through:

- Online survey
- Email & other written submissions
- Workshops around the world

Feedback received from:

- 1832 formal submissions to the online survey
- 2300 participants in total





Main findings

- 1. Elements stakeholders would like to see covered as a **minimum** in a sustainability report (strategy overview, material impacts, risks, material indicators)
- 2. GRI should define and recommend a set of topics and indicators by **sector**
- 3. G4 should offer guidance on how to link sustainability reporting and **integrated reporting**
- Topics top 6: Business Ethics, Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Eco-Innovation, Life Cycle Assessment, Water, Biodiversity
